# Maths: Choosing the Correct Number for Groups of Objects 1 to 5 Home Learning Challenges


For each activity, children will need the numbers one to five written out on to five pieces of paper.

Ask a grown-up or a friend to make a tower using between one and five bricks. Count the number of bricks they used and hold up this number.




Make a start line and a finish line on the floor. At the start line, line up five toy cars. Can you push them and see how far they go? Count how many go over the finish line. Can you point to this number?

Ask a grown-up or friend to place between one to five small objects in a bag. Without looking, feel inside the bag and count how many objects there are. Can you point to this number?


Ask a grown-up to place between one and five socks in the washing machine. Can you take them out and count them? Find the number card that shows this number.





### Snake Initial Sounds Game
