#### Projects for the Week

#### Science

Our new topic is sound. You are going to be looking at what sound is and how it is made this week. You will be conducting your own investigation. You need to collect 5 items in your household (pots, glass cup, drum etc.) and you will be testing each one to see if it makes a sound. First, you must make a prediction for the question: Will an object make a sound? You can make a table to show your predictions. Next, leave the objects on a flat surface. Do they make a sound? Then, tap the objects. Do they make a sound now? Create a table to show your results. Think about why you heard a sound from the objects when you did. Why do you think this happened? Did you ever not hear a sound? Write a conclusion to your investigation answering these questions.
